Compassion for the Fallen

Introduction

Question: When have you been tempted to gloat over someone's downfall?

Obadiah is the OT's shortest book. It is unique among OT prophetic books in being directed against a foreign nation, without any oracles of judgment against either Israel or Judah. However, the purpose is more than to warn Edom of imminent judgment. It is to reassure God's people of His triumphant justice at work for them.

Question: What is the thrust and emphasis of the promises towards God's people as given in

verses 17-21?

Question: What special significance do you see in God's promises in verse 21?

Question: In the rich and striking imagery that marks Obadiah's words in this book, which

images stand out most strongly to you?

Question: What does the book of Obadiah communicate most to you about the heart and

character of God?
